Focus (if applicable)	Erie High School is an Advanced Placement /Honors Focus School with an Engineering and Aerospace Academy . These rigorous academic programs provide students at Erie High School the opportunity to pursue collegiate level work, earn college credits and forge potential career networking opportunities, all of which prepare students to be college and career ready. Because of the rigorous opportunities provided to our students, Erie High School was chosen by the College Board to host one of the first AP Capstone programs in the state. Students at Erie High School take achievement to the next level in the classroom AND in the athletics and the performing arts.
Overview of Gifted Programming Options	Gifted students have the opportunity to be part of the Gifted and Talented Seminar class. Students in this class focus on: SAT prep, affective skills, college and career research, and autonomous learner skills. Their learning culminates with a passion project of their design and implementation.
Enrichment Options	The Gifted Building Representative checks to make sure that gifted students are enrolled in appropriate classes for their areas of giftedness. Students have opportunities for advanced study in math, science, social studies, English, engineering, art, music, and drama. College classes are available on campus in addition to Advanced Placement classes and CU Succeed classes.
Social/Emotional Support	The Gifted Building Representative works with the school interventionist on creating opportunities for students to get support in needed areas. This support may be one-on-one, small group, or lunchtime meetings.
Classroom Differentiation and Extensions	In addition to the honors and AP classes available, teachers employ a variety of differentiation techniques for students in the classroom. These include: compacting the curriculum to prevent repetition, grouping with like peers within the classroom, choice-based assessments to demonstrate mastery of concepts, and varying levels of depth and complexity of assignments. Students have opportunities to engage in a variety of clubs outside of the school day to take their learning beyond the classroom: Odyssey of the Mind , Mock Debate, Model UN, Math Honors Society, Cadaver Lab, Teens with Wings (Leadership and philanthropic club), Leadership, and National Honors Society. Students are encouraged and supported in taking Advanced Placement classes, Honors classes, and college classes while at Erie High School.
Other	At Erie High School, students are innovative thinkers and many times the catalyst for new opportunities.
